Careerforce Apprenticeship is a training program that leads to staff gaining their New Zealand Certificate in Health and Wellbeing Level 4.

The program is directed towards experienced staff, building on the technical skills they already have, to develop their critical thinking, reflective practice and expanding their toolkit.

Careerforce delivers this apprenticeship that has been developed by the sector, for the sector.

At PSSC we have 28 staff studying towards this Certificate, two at Wallingford, 18 at Community Services, three at Margaret Wilson and five at the Croft.

The apprenticeship commenced in November 2021 and this month we celebrated the apprentices successful completion of the Stage 1, Level 3 component of their certificate. Well done to you all, we are very proud of the hard work you have invested into your study.

Family Works Update



Family Whatever happened to the last three Works months, I know that December and January seem to have just flown past so

quickly and here we are in February already. December was certainly a very busy month at Family Works in the lead up to Christmas.

I wanted to take this opportunity to sincerely thank everyone in our community that supports our Foodbank. We have experienced unprecedented demand for food support over the past 3 months and without your ongoing support we would not be able to meet this need in our community. We provided 120 families with Christmas food hampers; this was in addition to the 135 food parcels that were distributed in December.

A special thank you to Timaru Suburban Lions Club for their annual "Toot for Tucker" appeal - this year was exceptional in what was collected and distributed to foodbanks.

The Timaru Herald Christmas Tree appeal again this year was invaluable in supporting many families in our community and once again due to the generosity of our community we were able to support 100 families.

We are recipients of the 2023 *Central South Island Charity* Bike Ride, we have been supporting the practice rides for the past three months with the official three day event running from the 16 to 18 February. This is a fantastic event to be a part of. We will be using the funds received from this event to support the co-ordination of our foodbank.

We are extremely fortunate to be supported by so many community groups/organisations/service clubs and individuals. Together we do make a difference every day.

Christmas Angel Project 2022

Really making a difference in our Community.

Christmas 2022 saw this project support the largest number of families since the project began. The total number of families supported was 179, an increase of 49 from the previous year. The total number of sponsors was 144, with quite a number of these sponsoring more than one family. Many of these were first time sponsors and this was also our largest number of sponsors since the project began.

In the current economic climate, it was very apparent that there was a great need for families to be supported at what is obviously a stressful time of year for many. This year family referrals were accepted from Plunket, Multicultural Aoraki, Arowhenua Whanua Services, Refugee Settlement Services as well as Family Works.

With some extra effort and some special support from wonderful sponsors we

managed to go the extra mile for some families this year. In one case, the 6 year old great grandson, being raised by his great grandmother, wanted to go to Scouts. The great grandmother has limited mobility and uses a walking frame. Because of this it was difficult for her to transport him anywhere and she could not afford the fees. We were able to facilitate this, and it really meant the world to this family.

This is an amazing project to be involved with. The efforts made by the families to improve their lives and those of their families is so inspiring and the generosity and enthusiasm of our Christmas Angel sponsors is unbelievable.

A huge thank you to Aoraki Foundation for their continued support, this allows us to keep the Christmas Angel Project going for vulnerable families in our community.

With the generosity of the Christmas Angels last year nearly 180 local families were supported and were able to enjoy the miracle of Christmas. This year you can help a local family in need.

Refugee Settlement Services... Helping families to thrive.

Since our Annual Report in October the Refugee Settlement Service has been busier than ever, with our new Manager, Tracey Miron and new staff case worker, Ari Jan, the former refugee families are really getting the best possible support.

Prior to November 2022 we had three families, at time of print we will have six with another five arriving in the next two months. This will mean 27 adults and 34 children.

The Syrian community is now starting to grow and feel settled in our community. There has been some fantastic progress with our families and some are already working within our community.



Starting school is a big challenge for our families so a very big thank you to Timaru Girls High School, Timaru Boys High School, Waimataitai and Gleniti Schools, Rotary North JR McKenzie Trust Fund and other private donors for the assistance you have given us

so far with your donations and support.

There is always so much more for these families to learn and experience but with our team and the amazing community they are able to be supported in their journey to independence.

Volunteers were out and about over summertime doing all sorts of interesting and exciting things with families to help them feel welcome and settled in Timaru. From trips to Centennial Park for picnics and play, to Caroline Bay for carnival rides, swimming, and walks, even fishing on South Beach where there was lots of laughter and fishy tales, but not many actual fish caught!

Road Safety Day with New Zealand Police During the summer holidays the families and volunteers attended a Road Safety and picnic day at Caroline Bay with NZ Police where the children and parents learned about safety on the roads and bike safety in particular.

It was great fun and the children and adults all picked up vital safety tips for biking on Timaru roads. It was also a great day for everyone to mingle and practise English where possible and see our NZ police officers in a positive light as 'helping people'.



Donations of bikes and bike helmets (for adults and children), school supplies and uniforms have been greatly received and still required. These items are so vital for former refugee children to settle into school, and until adults are able to obtain drivers licenses, bicycles are an important mode of transport for the whole family.

A recent former refugee is now working part time at Murrays Barbers on Church St. He worked as a barber in his home country



and is very grateful for being given the opportunity to work and continue his English studies.





A big thank you to **Grantlea Downs** school for the use of your swimming pool where our wonderful volunteers have been taking the children for a few summer water safety lessons. This was a wonderful chance for the children to get used to getting into the water and experiencing a Kiwi swim lesson before school starts with school swimming requirements.
